A Global Resource


The Biodiversity Heritage Library is a growing international consortium, with program nodes in Australia, Brazil, China, Egypt, and Europe as well as the US and UK. ued global growth with the official launch of BHL Africa, the Fourth Annual Global-BHL meeting and BHL's active participation in the ICADLA conference, both held in Morocco.

On April 15, 2013, we welcomed BHL-Africa as the most recent node in the BHL global consortium. The launch was hosted at the South African National Biodiversity Institute (SANBI) at the Pretoria National Botanical Garden in Pretoria, South Africa and kicked off with a launch ceremony, at which Dr. Tanya Abrahamse, SANBI CEO and Nancy Gwinn (Chair of the BHL Executive Committee) signed the BHL-Africa MOU. Over the next two days, workshop sessions addressed workflow and organizational questions, covering topics such as collections development, copyright, communication, and infrastructure. The final day of the meeting was spent identifying preliminary tasks for a two-year BHL-Africa workplan and electing a BHL-Africa Steering Committee.

In May, efforts to strengthen global initiatives continued with the Fourth Annual Global-BHL Meeting held in Fez, Morocco, May 27-28, 2013. Eight members representing all Global-BHL nodes (with the exception of BHL-SciElo in Brazil) convened to report on their accomplishments over the last 12 months and to discuss goals for extending content, services and participation within each of the nodes. Later that week, several attendees continued on to Ifrane, Morocco for the 3rd International Conference on African Digital Libraries and Archives (ICADLA).



The US/UK component continues to collaborate on actively broadening visibility and access for the collections available through the original BHL portal. On May 6-7, the US/UK component of BHL gathered for the 7th Annual Institutional Council Meeting held at the Marine Biological Laboratory in Woods Hole, MA. Topics included the approval of the 2013 Dues Budget; proposed updates to the BHL membership structure; and fundraising possibilities. Additionally, new mission, vision and goal statements—outlined on the following page—were approved.

In addition, we have expanded visibility for US/UK collections by serving as a content hub for the Digital Public Library of America (DPLA), which launched on April 18. As a result of BHL's participation, links to over 115,000 BHL volumes have been made available within the DPLA portal. Through the DPLA, the Biodiversity Heritage Library is collaborating with renowned libraries, universities, archives and museums to reach a wide national audience. Finally, in May, BHL received the Charles Robert Long Award of Extraordinary Merit from the Council on Botanical and Horticultural Libraries (CBHL).

Mission, Vision and Goals

The Biodiversity Heritage Library is a consortium of natural history and botanical libraries that cooperate to digitize and make accessible the legacy taxonomic literature of biodiversity held in their collections and to make that literature available for open access and responsible use as a part of a global "biodiversity commons." To help guide the BHL's extensive efforts in global collaboration and open access, the BHL Steering Committee has approved new Mission, Vision and Goal Statements. Work on these statements began at the September 2012 BHL Staff and Technical Meeting. Two staff subcommittees drafted suggestions from that meeting into vision and goal statements. The BHL Secretariat then took all of the recommendations provided by staff and produced the vision, mission, and goal statements which were presented at the 2013 BHL Institutional Council Meeting, May 6-7, in Woods Hole, MA. The BHL Steering Committee applied final revisions and approved the statements as BHL's new official vision, mission, and goals:

Vision:

Inspiring discovery through free access to biodiversity knowledge.

Mission:

The Biodiversity Heritage Library works collaboratively to make biodiversity literature openly available to the world as part of a global biodiversity community.

Goals:

Goal 1: Relevant Content

Build and maintain the BHL as the largest reliable, reputable, and responsive repository of biodiversity literature and archival materials.

Goal 2: Tools and Services

Develop services and tools which facilitate discovery and improve research efficiency of BHL content.

Goal 3: User Engagement


Increase global awareness about the BHL through outreach, learning and education, and branding through engagement and collaboration with existing and new user communities.

Goal 4: Membership and Partnerships

Grow BHL consortia membership and partnerships while fostering cross-institutional collaboration that continues to serve as a model for digital library development.

Goal 5: Financial Sustainability

Ensure sustainability and relevance by being flexible, adaptable, and financially sound while the content and services remain openly and freely available.



Highlights

BHL-Africa Launches

April 15th, BHL-Africa officially launched. The event was marked by a three-day launch and workshop hosted by the South African National Biodiversity Institute (SANBI) at the Pretoria National Botanical Garden in Pretoria, South Africa. BHL-Africa's mission is to provide open access to the valuable biodiversity literature found within African libraries and institutions. The workshop addressed the BHL-Africa MOU, workflows and organizational strategies, identifying a two-year work plan and electing a Steering Committee representing each of the three nodes: North/Central; Eastern; and Southern. We look forward to seeing great things from BHL-Africa!

Fourth Annual Global BHL Meeting

The Fourth Annual Global BHL Meeting was held in Fez, Morocco, May 27-28. The meeting provided an opportunity for representatives from each BHL Node (with the exception of Brazil) to convene, share their accomplishments and discuss their goals. William Ulate, Global BHL Coordinator & BHL US/UK Technical Director, said of the event: "Learning from each other's successes and experiences helps us to keep working together, ensure redundancy and resilience, while at the same time increasing new unique content, tools and services that provide novel opportunities for collaborations."











BHL at ICADLA- 3

BHL participated in the 3rd International Conference on African Digital Libraries and Archives in Ifrane, Morocco, May 30-31, 2013. Program Director Martin Kalfatovic moderated a special panel presentation by members of the Global Biodiversity Heritage Library community. Panelists demonstrated how their work on the BHL global nodes can serve as a model for other large-scale digital library collections. Attendees also had an opportunity to learn about other exciting digital library initiatives, notably the Moroccan Digital Library discussed by Mr. Driss Khrouz, Director of the National Library of the Kingdom of Morocco.

CBHL Long Award of Extraordinary Merit

In May, the Biodiversity Heritage Library received the Charles Robert Long Award of Extraordinary Merit from the Council on Botanical and Horticultural Libraries (CBHL). The highest honor bestowed by CBHL, this award recognizes outstanding contribution and meritorious service to CBHL or to the field of botanical and horticultural libraries or literature. The award letter states: "In an era that is increasingly focused on biodiversity, BHL has become an indispensible resource for many scholars, scientists and students." As part of the honor, BHL received a certificate and lifelong institutional membership to CBHL.


Celebrating Aquatic Biodiversity





BHL collects user feedback and collaborates to resolve feedback using an issue tracking system, Countersoft's Gemini product. User feedback includes notifications of errors with scanned content, suggestions for service improvements, and requests for content to be scanned. Some scanning requests are considered "Special Handling" as they constitute requests for rare, oversized or fragile material.

measuring the use of bhl resources

Measuring the use of BHL resources involves more than simply tracking website visits. BHL content is dispersed amongst a variety of databases and websites, including the BHL blog and Flickr. Furthermore, thanks to the DOIs (digital object identifiers) associated with our collections, we can also track usage originating from users clicking on citations to BHL content in external sources. The statistics presented here attempt to capture a complete picture of BHL usage while also considering the original usage source.



Each DOI resolution translates to a visit to BHL. When users cite BHL resources, they can include the DOI (essentially a link) to that item in BHL. Thus, DOI resolutions represent a baseline for how much traffic comes to BHL because users cite our collections.





measuring user engagement

Measuring the success of BHL is about more than just tracking usage and audience. We also want to evaluate whether our users are having meaningful interactions with our content. How much time does a user actually spend on our site, how many pages do they view when they visit us, and how frequently are they returning to use our services? Within our other outreach platforms, are users simply passively monitoring what we're posting, or do they actually interact with it, have conversations with us about it, enhance it, and share our content with other people? The metrics presented in this spread attempt to reflect how engaged our users really are with us and our resources.



WEBSITE ENGAGEMENT





Who: Dr. Eric Danell, botanist

Where: Director, Dokmai Garden, Chang Mai, Thailand

Research Specialty: Gardens and botanical research

BHL Use: Eric uses BHL several times a week, typically verifying plant species descriptions online but occasionally also downloading PDFs. He finds Linnaeus' Species Plantarum (1753, volumes 1-2) to be an especially useful resource found in BHL. "This is the origin of plant research and so many important plants, also in the tropics, are described here. [Linnaeus'] spelling, his comments, and his references are cruical to botanical research."

BHL Impact: "BHL is a crucial tool since I am located in the Asian tropics. Although I have a private rare books collection in Sweden, I dare not bring it here due to termites and moulds. The fact that I can sit in a remote corner of the world and access rare books is awesome! BHL is my favorite."

Who: Dr. Brian Pitkin and Paul Jenkins

Where: The Natural History Museum in London

Research Specialty: Lepidoptera

BHL Use: Brian and Paul have used BHL to update and revitalise the Generic Names of Moths of the World: Generic Names and their Type Species, a catalogue of more than 32,000 genus-group names Lepidoptera, by adding links to BHL content to the cited references.

BHL Impact: Information in the catalog now includes:

- 54% (17,479) of the 32,188 included genus-group names have links to BHL scanned images.
- 64% (17,976) of the 27,891 included type species have links to BHL scanned images.
- 58% (2,297) of the 3,944 included type species designations have links to BHL scanned images.
- The catalogue bibliography includes 8,863 references, of which 3,741 (42%) have been scanned by BHL.



about bhl

The Biodiversity Heritage Library (BHL) is a consortium of 15 natural history and botanical libraries that work collaboratively to make biodiversity literature openly available to the world as part of a global biodiversity community.

The BHL consortium works with the international taxonomic community, rights holders, and other interested parties to ensure that this biodiversity heritage is made available to a global audience through open access principles. Today, in partnership with the Internet Archive and through local digitization efforts, BHL has digitized over 41 million pages of taxonomic literature, representing over 61,000 titles and 116,000 volumes (August 2013).

The published literature on biological diversity has limited global distribution; much of it is available in only a few select libraries in the developed world. Biologists have long considered that access to the published literature is one of the chief impediments to the efficiency of research in the field. Among other results, free global access to digitized versions of the literature would repatriate information about the earth's species to all parts of the world.

Since 2009, the BHL has expanded globally. The European Commission's eContentPlus program has funded the BHL-Europe project, with 28 institutions, to assemble the European language literature. Additionally, the Chinese Academy of Sciences, the Atlas of Living Australia, Brazil (through SciELO and BIREME), and the Bibliotheca Alexandrina have created regional BHL nodes. The newest global node, BHL-Africa, officially launched in April, 2013. These projects will work together to share content, protocols, services, and digital preservation practices.



Staff Changes




